For decades, NCCJ has honored outstanding citizens who have improved our community with the Brotherhood/Sisterhood Citation Award. To identify deserving candidates, NCCJ welcomes nominations from across the Triad. The 2010 award will be presented at the Brotherhood/Sisterhood Citation Award Dinner on Wednesday, November 17, 2010, at the Koury Convention Center in Greensboro, North Carolina.
